Risk Assessment for Torquay Academy from September 2021

Introduction

Government guidance is that from Autumn term 2021 Covid 19 prevention measures remain in place until further updates are issued. This update seeks to follow this guidance in relation to our specific site. However, where any unintentional variance becomes apparent the government guidance should be referred to as accurate (see link below).

In order to ensure that we have all health and safety measures in place, we have considered the following issues and safeguarding measures, we recognise that local decisions may need to be flexible: This risk assessment will need to be dynamic in order to deal with any additional issues that arise or are identified once the school is fully operational. The risk assessment has been prepared by the Senior Leadership Team, consulted on by union representatives and reviewed by the Governors.

To enable the school to open safely for all students and to minimise the risk of transmission of coronavirus (Covid-19) the academy will continue to operate in areas dedicated to distinct year groups. Appendix 1 shows the planned layout. This arrangement will be reflected throughout the Risk Assessment.

Torquay Academy will continue to implement a system of controls creating a safer environment where the risk of transmission of the virus for both staff and students is substantially reduced. These measures remain the same for the new variants and all stakeholders are encouraged to adhere to the measures aimed at preventing transmission.

In developing this Risk Assessment it is recognised that control measures should be sensible and proportionate to facilitating the education of all students.

It is however recognised that whilst measures can be recommended in school, in the wider community there is greater freedom to mix that previously and thus the risk of transmission out of school cannot be mitigated. All stakeholders should try to minimise their interaction with each other in the non school environment and maintain a degree of social distancing at all times.

This risk assessment will be divided into six sections that reflect the DfE guidance:

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



Practical Music Delivery Guidelines (Covid) March 2021

For a planned March return to practical music delivery, the following guidelines have been developed using information provided by the Department of Education and Music Mark.

- All KS3 music lessons will (wherever possible) now take place in F4 which is a significantly larger teaching space than F12 and will enable better social distancing amongst students and staff
- All students and staff members will sanitise their hands on entry and exit from the teaching space
- Face coverings should be worn at all times except when the teacher permits for them to be removed
- All instruments and practical equipment that students have used in their lesson used will be wiped down and sanitised between classes
- Students will now be collected and brought to their lessons by their teachers. As students move between learning spaces they will be in register order and will be expected to remain so as the enter the learning space and begin the lesson
- Students will not be allowed to leave the teaching space unsupervised

- Transitions will be closely monitored to ensure that social distancing is adhered to
- Students will be required to work in their own 'learning space'. For some students, this might mean sharing a keyboard. However, students will sit side-by-side and facing the same direction. Students will not be allowed to move around the classroom unless they are given permission to do so
- All unused equipment & furniture will be removed from practical teaching spaces to maximise the space the students have to work in
- There will be no whole class singing to take place in lessons for the foreseeable future
- TME will review & update what SOL are appropriate for students, but the amended curriculum will be focused primarily around instrumental work. Singing will be kept to a minimum and will be in closely supervised smaller ensembles to ensure social distancing measures are adhered to and students are positioned side-by-side and facing in the same direction
- Students will no longer be able to use the corridor as breakout space if there are students from another year group working there

Measures within the classroom

Maintaining a distance between people whilst inside and reducing the amount of time they are in face to face to contact lowers the risk of transmission. It is strong public health advice that staff in secondary schools maintain distance from their pupils, staying at the front of the class, and away from their colleagues where possible. Ideally, adults should maintain 2 metre distance from each other, and from children.

Schools should make small adaptations to the classroom to support distancing where possible. That should include seating pupils side by side and facing forwards, rather than face to face or side on, and might include moving unnecessary furniture out of classrooms to make more space.

Appendix 2b

Covid Peripatetic Music

March 2021

For a planned March return for peripatetic music lessons we propose to follow guidance from Music Mark (UK Association of Music Education).

- Peripatetic tutors will be able to use the practise middle practise room and control room in The Platform for lessons. These rooms all enable more than adequate social distancing and ensure that no pupils will have to enter a classroom of students in a separate bubble.
- Face coverings should be worn until the teacher says it is fine to remove it. The face covering must to re-applied before leaving the practice room
- Peri tutors should keep their doors open (when applicable) to ensure adequate ventilation.
- Students will not cross independently cross schools and teachers will be required to be collected from every lesson.
- Students will be encouraged to bring in their own instrument / drum sticks.

- Students required to sanitise hands upon entering the classroom.
- Tutors (particularly guitar and piano) to sanitize instruments between use.
- Singing tutors advised to teach from a side profile as to avoid direct exposure to student airflow.
- Singing lessons must maintain a strict minimum of two meters during practise (as recommended in the Music Mark peri guidance).
- Following government guidance tutors may wish to wear a face covering, though not mandatory.

Torquay Academy

Core PE Delivery Guidelines (Covid-19)

March 2021

For a planned March return to practical physical education delivery, the following guidelines have been developed using information provided by the Department of Education and the various Governing Bodies of Sport.

- · All of the sports hall changing rooms will be cleaned each morning prior to the start of lesson 2. In addition to this all changing rooms will be cleaned at the end of every lesson throughout the day ready for the next groups use. This will be during break 1 and break 2. This will include the cleaning of toilets as access to the toilets will be granted if necessary.
- Face coverings should be worn when moving to and from the lesson and in the changing rooms
- Face coverings do not need to be worn during activity and may be left in the changing room
- As much as possible PE lessons will take place outside
- On entry and exit to and from the sports areas all students and staff members will sanitise their hands on entry and exit from the teaching space
- All practical equipment that students have used in their lesson used will be wiped down and sanitised between classes
- Students will now be collected and brought to their lessons by their teachers. As students move
 between learning spaces, they will be in register order and will be expected to remain so as the
 enter the changing rooms and move between learning spaces.

- Students will change in the same changing room using the same space within that changing room for each lesson. As far as practicable students will observe social distancing whilst in the changing rooms.
- At this stage the policy of not lending out PE kit will be adopted, this may change as the situation changes, although it is the expectation that every student brings their PE kit to every lesson anyway.
- Students will not be allowed to leave the teaching space unsupervised. If it is completely necessary students will be allowed to use the toilets as they will be cleaned in between lessons.
- Transitions will be closely monitored to ensure that social distancing is adhered to.
- We will follow the most up to date guidelines that every sport's governing body has published regarding how we conduct our lessons. As a rule of thumb at the time of writing these protocol's students will work in small groups, ideally no more than 6 and contact will be kept to a minimum during lessons. At this stage we will not be playing any full contact (rugby) sports, we will, where appropriate adapt some sports to minimise contact.
- If students use the fitness suite for their Core PE lessons the same protocols in place for the fitness suite seen at appendix 2d will apply
- All unused equipment will be removed from practical teaching spaces to maximise the space the students have to work in.

- The PE curriculum for September has been written taking into account all of the latest guidelines, we have adapted some sports and adopted a more generic approach so that skills that the students may have missed out on because of the restrictions are still taught.
- At the end of the lesson students will be escorted back to their learning areas in the same manner as they arrived for their PE lesson.
- After school clubs will take place between 3.15-4.15pm. Prior to activities commencing the area to be used and the equipment required will be cleaned.
- To avoid transmission after school activities will be carried out in year groups. Year 8 on a Monday, Year 7 on a Tuesday and Year 9 on a Wednesday.
- The facility will be cleaned again prior to the evening bookings.

Torquay Academy

Fitness Suite Delivery Guidelines (Covid)

March 2021

For a planned 12 April 2021 return to opening the fitness suite to members of the public, the following guidelines have been developed using information provided by the Fitness Industry guidelines.

- Face coverings should be worn in circulation and changing areas but may be removed when entering the fitness suite
- The fitness suite and equipment within will be cleaned and sanitised prior to opening the facility each day.
- · Sports centre staff will ensure that the equipment is sanitised regular throughout the opening hours. Equipment will be sprayed clean.
- · Users will be asked to ensure that they clean equipment used after they have finished with it in preparation for the next user, they will also be encouraged to sanitise equipment when they first use it, this will ensure that equipment is thoroughly cleaned for each use. The blue tissue paper and a spray will be used for this cleaning.
- · There will be signs placed around the fitness suite reminding users of these measures.
- · Initially the fitness suite will be open to members only, this will assist us should the need for a track and trace scenario be necessary. This can be reviewed as restrictions are eased.

- · All users will be required to sanitise their hands on entry and exit to the fitness suite.
- · The doors of the fitness suite will be left open to assist the flow of air.
- · Initially we will limit the number of users at any one time to 10, again this will be reviewed as measures are eased. If numbers dictate, we will also consider a booking system, allocating users time slots. This will NOT be introduced unless absolutely necessary.
- · Users will need to arrive changed ready for their workout as we will not be providing changing facilities.
- · There will be no showers available initially.
- · Toilets will be available if required.

Appendix 4 Actions to take where Covid-19 is suspected or confirmed

Information relating to actions to be taken in the event of a positive diagnosis for Covid-19 are changing frequently. For example, there is now guidance available on the use of face masks in lockdown conditions.

TA will ensure that the latest guidance is adhered to in all circumstances and will be in contact regularly with PHE (SW) to ensure that appropriate actions are taken in the event of an outbreak.

Member of a class or staff becoming unwell with suspected COVID-19 In the event that a child presents with any symptoms then the parent/guardians will be contacted immediately.

Contact PHE Health Protection Team on 0300 303 8162 to notify so they can support risk assessment and follow up.

If a child is awaiting collection, they will be moved to a room where they can be isolated behind a closed door with ventilation (these have been identified for each area), with appropriate adult supervision. If it is not possible to isolate them (eg if more than one person displaying symptoms), move them to an area (outdoors if weather is ok) which is at least 2 metres away from other people.

Ensure suitable PPE, including fluid resistant face mask is available at this location and worn by the supervising adult delegated to monitor the child so they are prepared to respond to the child in the event that they need urgent attention.

On collection of the child, it will be confirmed with the parent that they are aware of how to get the child tested and confirm that they will let the school know the result as soon as they are aware.

In the event that a member of staff presents with symptoms, they will immediately remove themselves from the school having notified a member of staff, at a safe distance, as well as confirming where they've been and with whom so cleaning can be immediately initiated to any affected areas and contacts within school closely monitored. The member of staff will, as soon as they are able, arrange to be tested and will provide the school with the test results as soon as practicable.

Clean and disinfect rooms the suspected case was using – ensure appropriate PPE (gloves and apron) are used.

Appropriate PPE is provided in all areas

Member of a class or staff has a confirmed positive test for COVID-19

As from September 2021 only those displaying symptoms of Covid 19 or with a confirmed positive case need to self isolate

On confirmation that a member of a class cohort, either child or member of staff, has had a positive test, ensure they stay at home for 10 days (day of onset + nine days). The rest of their household need to self-isolate for 10 days.

Contact the PHE SW Health Protection Team on 0300 303 8162 immediately so they can support the risk assessment and advise about follow up.

Advise that anyone with symptoms get tested:

Staff and children over 5: online via nhs.uk/coronaviruschildren Children under 5: Call NHS 111.

Any siblings also in the same setting (but a different, unaffected area) would need to isolate at this point

The HPT will undertake an assessment to determine whether contacts in the setting need to self-isolate at home for 14 days.

Clean and disinfect rooms the case was using if this has not already been done – ensure appropriate PPE (minimum gloves and apron) are used.

Subject to PHE advice, the whole cohort may need to be isolated within their room or, if weather permits, in an outside location, whilst parents/guardians are notified to collect them.

Subject to PHE advice, once all children have been collected then the staff will make their way home to begin their isolation and the classroom will be subject to a cleaning regime agreed with the cleaners for a location where there has been a positive test https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/covid-19-stay-at-home-guidance

Appendix 5

The recommended use of face coverings and how to use them safely

(Extract from Schools coronavirus (COVID-19) operational guide February 2021

This guidance is no longer mandatory but a temporary recommendation is in force in Torbay for September 2021

2. Ensure face coverings are used in recommended circumstances

Where pupils in year 7 (which would be children who were aged 11 on 31 August 2020) and above are educated, we recommend that face coverings should be worn by adults and pupils when moving around the premises, outside of classrooms, such as in corridors and communal areas where social distancing cannot easily be maintained. Face coverings do not need to be worn by pupils when outdoors on the premises.

In addition, we now also recommend in those schools, that face coverings should be worn in classrooms or during activities unless social distancing can be maintained. This does not apply in situations where wearing a face covering would impact on the ability to take part in exercise or strenuous activity, for example in PE lessons. In primary schools, we recommend that face coverings should be worn by staff and adult visitors in situations where social distancing between adults is not possible (for

example, when moving around in corridors and communal areas). Children in primary school do not need to wear a face covering.

We are taking this additional precautionary measure for a limited time during this period of high coronavirus (COVID-19) prevalence in the community. These measures will be in place until Easter. As with all measures, we will keep it under review and update guidance at that point.

Transparent face coverings, which may assist communication with someone who relies on lip reading, clear sound or facial expression to communicate, can also be worn. There is currently very limited evidence regarding the effectiveness or safety of transparent face coverings, but they may be effective in reducing the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19).

Those who rely on visual signals for communication, or communicate with or provide support to such individuals, are currently exempt from any requirement to wear face coverings in schools or in public places.

Face visors or shields should not be worn as an alternative to face coverings. They may protect against droplet spread in specific circumstances but are unlikely to be effective in reducing aerosol transmission when used without an additional face covering. They should only be used after carrying out a risk assessment for the specific situation and should always be cleaned appropriately.

Exemptions

Some individuals are exempt from wearing face coverings. This applies to those who:

- cannot put on, wear or remove a face covering because of a physical impairment or disability, illness or mental health difficulties
- speak to or provide help to someone who relies on lip reading, clear sound or facial expression to communicate

The same exemptions will apply in education and childcare settings and you should be sensitive to those needs, noting that some people are less able to wear face coverings and that the reasons for this may not be visible to others.

Access to face coverings

Due to the increasing use of face coverings in wider society, staff and pupils are already likely to have access to face coverings. PHE has also published guidance on how to make a simple face covering.

You should have a small contingency supply available for people who:

- are struggling to access a face covering
- are unable to use their face covering as it has become damp, soiled or unsafe
- have forgotten their face covering

No pupil should be denied education on the grounds that they are not wearing a face covering.

Safe wearing and removal of face coverings

You should have a process for when face coverings are worn within your school and how they should be removed. You should communicate this process clearly to pupils, staff and visitors and allow for adjustments to be made for pupils with SEND who may be distressed if required to remove a face covering against their

wishes.

Safe wearing of face coverings requires the:

- cleaning of hands before and after touching including to remove or put them
 on
- safe storage of them in individual, sealable plastic bags between use

 Where a face covering becomes damp, it should not be worn, and the face covering
 should be replaced carefully. Staff and pupils may consider bringing a spare face
 covering to wear if their face covering becomes damp during the day.
 - not touch the front of their face covering during use or when removing it
 - dispose of temporary face coverings in a 'black bag' waste bin (not recycling bin)
 - place reusable face coverings in a plastic bag they can take home with them
 - wash their hands again before heading to their classroom
